Council expands Ridgeport TIF again

Wilmington's TIF District at Ridgeport will change again to accommodate another mega warehouse on South Kavanaugh Road. City Aldermen approved changes to the Lorenzo Road TIF District to allow for Project Gemini, development of a 1.65 million square foot warehouse that will house operations for Amazon.com, LLC. The third amendment is between the city of Wilmington and Amazon.com, LLC, ADAR Ridgeport Industrial Partners, LLC, and ADAR RPLL, LLC. A public hearing was held before the regular council meeting with no opposition given. The measure for Elion Logistics Park TIF district passed with the addition of a lot at 30955 S. Kavanaugh Road, PIN no. 03-17-21-300-023-0000. As no members of the public appeared to object, the council approved the expansion. History of TIF district

May 10, 2010: Wilmington City Council passed three ordinances to adopt the redevelopment plan and project, dated Feb. 16, 2010, designating the TIF for the Ridgeport Logistics Center Intermodal Terminal Facility Area (Ridgeport TIF). Sept. 2, 2014: The city council amended the original ordinances to remove 14.5 acres of land from the project area. The project area was further amended on Jan. 3, 2017, providing for the addition of certain properties and the removal of others. 2016: The project was once again amended by the "2016 Amendment to the Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment Plan and Project" for the Ridgeport Logistics Center, which was approved pursuant to the Jan. 3, 2017 ordinance providing for the addition of certain properties. After filing the ordinance and plan amendment with the Will County Clerk, it was discovered that three of the six parcels added to the project area were not annexed into the

city. The parcels were excluded from the project. Oct. 17, 2017, The city annexed 34 additional parcels adjoining or in the vicinity of the Ridgeport TIF, two of which were part of the 2016 Plan Amendment. The Will County Clerk subsequently certified the base equalized assessed value (EAV) for the two parcels, which then became part of Ridgeport TIF. Aug. 2019: The project was further amended to provide for further modifications to the project boundaries by adding certain properties and removing others. At this time, Ridgeport Logistics Park was renamed as Elion Logistics Park 55. May 4, 2021: The project area was further amended by adding certain properties and removing others. At the request of the developer, the city wants to further amend the original plan to change the project area to include one additional property that has already been annexed into the city. The addition will not materially affect the size of the project

area, which will remain below the two square mile limit specified in the TIF act. 2024 Plan Amendment With the addition of the Amazon warehouse, the equalized assessed valuation of the project will reach \$140 to \$150 million upon completion of the next buildout. Another solar farm proposal Illinois has grown into the fourth largest U.S. state for adopting community solar plants. So, it's not surprising that another solar farm is being proposed near Wilmington-Peotone Road and Highway 53. "The new solar farm proposal is on the Hazzard property across from Waters Edge," Jeannine Smith, city administrator said. There was a brief discussion by the council, with alderpersons vowing not to support the proposed solar facility. For the record, the

Deadline for the coloring contest is Dec. 27 with entries due at the concession stand.

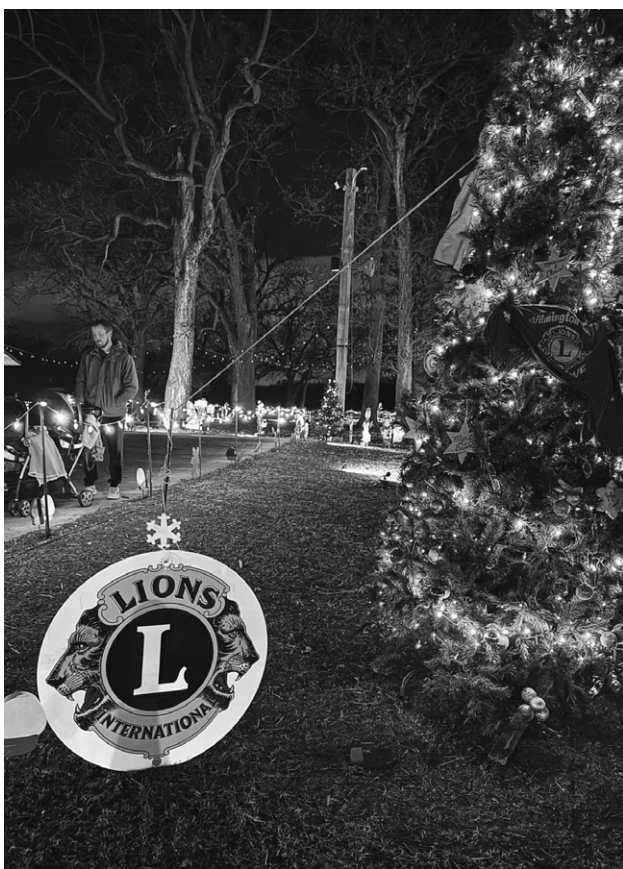
She said some people have made a tradition of walking the park on Christmas Eve. That's why the Lions keep it lit up all night on Dec. 24 and Dec. 31.

The newly-seated members of the Will County Board elected their leadership team at a reorganization meeting on Dec. 2 and Joe VanDuyne (D-Wilmington) was elected Speaker of the Will County Board.

"District 1 will still have the same representation," VanDuyne said "I am now responsible for representing all members of the board and all districts for what is best for our county as a whole."

Sherry Williams (D - Crest Hill) was elected Democratic Leader, and Jim Richmond (R - Mokena) was elected Republican Leader.

The November election did not change the 50-50 party split between Democrats and Republicans.

"The board is split evenly with 11 Democrats and 11 Republicans with a Democratic County Executive who may break a tie vote if she so chooses," VanDuyne said.

The speaker has the authority to set county board agendas. VanDuyne's party affiliation is therefore likely to make a difference.

"We have many diverse viewpoints on the county board, which is reflective of our county. My goal is to work collaboratively and fairly with all members to move Will County forward," VanDuyne said.

Of special note is VanDuyne is the first District 1 board member to serve as speaker.

A Will County Board member since 2018, VanDuyne has also served as chair of the Public Works and Transportation Committee and on the Executive and Capital Improvements Committee.

Williams has served on the County Board since 2022. She has served as the Vice Chair of the Ad Hoc Old Courthouse Committee and has served on the Executive, Public Works and Transportation, Public Health and Safety, and Ad Hoc Access will County Committee.

Richmond has served on the County Board since 2022. He has served as the Chair of the Finance Committee and Vice Chair of the Public Works and Transportation Committee. He has also served on the Executive and Capital Improvements Committee.

The county board also welcomed three new members, with Herbert Brooks (D-Joliet), Dawn Bullock (D-Plainfield), and Kelly Hickey (D-Naperville) sworn into office. Julie Berkowicz (R-Naperville), Vince Logan (R-Joliet), and Denise Winfrey (D-Joliet), who were re-elected in the November General Election, were also sworn into office at the Dec. 2 meeting.

Wilmington Police chief Adam Zink accepted a accreditation award last week from the Illinois Law Enforcement Accreditation Program (ILEAP) for a job well done.

Fred Hayes of the Chiefs of Police of the Illinois Association of Chiefs of Police presented the Wilmington department for achieving Tier 1 accreditation from ILEAP.

"Chief Zink and his staff have been very busy during this process over the past several months. This is a very rigorous process," Hayes said. "You probably all know that you have a very professional police department. I'm sure the community knows. But, now you actually have the badge of honor to prove it."

ILEAP accreditation required the Wilmington police to set meaningful and professional standards, and to meet them.

The department was assessed over three days last July. The assessment included department tours, vehicle inspection, interviews, ride alongs, and an exit interview.

"Acquiring accreditation is an important achievement for both the department and the community and has been a

top priority," Zink said. "A true measure of compliance with these standards is having peers review our practices in person, which is exactly what this assessment aims to achieve."

According to Hayes, there are only 64 ILEAP accredited police departments in Illinois.

"It's only about five percent of public police departments," Hayes said.

"So, this is a great achievement for the Wilmington Police Dept."

Accreditation lasts four years and requires the Wilmington Police Dept. to submit annual reports.

Christmas traditions in the 1870's

Today we are going on a journey, not unlike Scrooge's journey, to the past, the long past. Get aboard my time machine, turned sleigh, and together we will travel to the 1870's to find Christmas as it was celebrated then.

The 1870's was not a prosperous decade in Will County. During the early part of the decade, people were still recovering from the Civil War. An army of tramps, usually ex-soldiers who could not adjust to civilian life, were marching across the country - begging and stealing.

Gift giving was of course as important to the day as it is now. Stockings were hung on the mantle but if a mantle was not available, the tradition held that the stocking be hung on the doorknob outside. And the usual contents of the stocking were an orange, apple, bag of nuts or in some cases it was filled with coal, yes real coal. Bad behavior was not rewarded or over looked.

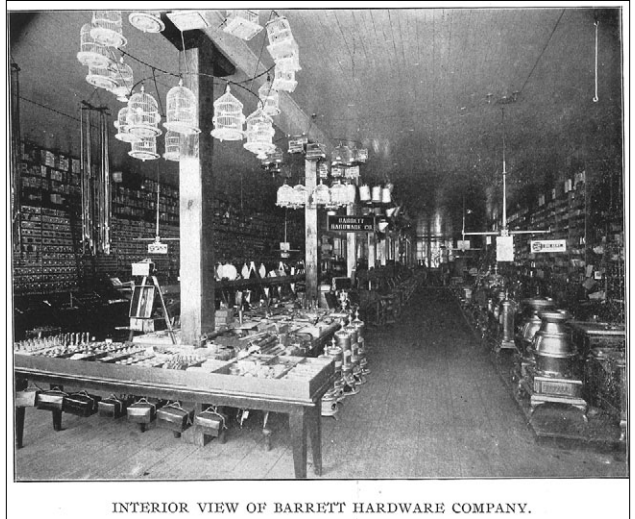
The gifts that children longed for were not much different than today. Dolls were, of course, always popular with the girls. In Joliet there was one store that specialized in them. We have the description of the store, from the Joliet Sun. "Mrs. B. Allen's, 13 Jefferson Street. Nowhere on earth has mortal eye ever gazed upon such an elaborate show of Holiday goods of every known description, especially dolls. It's a perfect world of

dolls - dolls little, dolls big, dolls fancy, dolls plain, no end of dolls, and among them we notice many very fine dolls, worth in the neighborhood of \$50 (\$1,500 today) each. Mrs.

Allen's "Doll's Fair" is attracting general notice, and the prize doll is a gem among its fellows - or sisters, rather, for we presume there are no dolls of the sterner sex - and should be seen by every person in the city."

Barrett's Hardware was also a going concern in 1876 and in its ad we read of typical holiday gift items. "Perhaps you wouldn't dream it, but in Barrett & Son's well-known establishment we find many an attraction for Holiday presents. What good matron's heart will not beat faster with joy on the receipt of a handsome set of knives and forks, table and teaspoons? And no place in this country can better goods be obtained for less money than at Barrett's. And then how happy it would make a boy to receive a fine pair of skates or a money bank such as the Barrett's sell for very low prices! The display of pocket cutlery is very extensive, and a good pocket knife is always an acceptable Holiday gift. In the line of new and improved styles of revolvers no one can surpass Barrett. Go there for the solid things."

Note that several of the gifts mentioned are politically incorrect today, the pocket knife is no longer an appropriate gift for a young boy, and certainly few think

of a revolver as a Christmas gift.

Men's gifts included boxes of cigars, meerschau pipes or cigar holders, or watch and chain. Neck ties were also popular gifts, probably, just as today, more popular in the giving, than in the receiving.

And how was Christmas day spent? Although we think of a traditional Christmas as one spent at home with the family, the tradition in the 1870's was not to sit at home, but to get out to greet your neighbors and friends at some sort of function. Christmas balls, usually masquerades, were the most popular, usually held on Christmas night. These were fund raising functions for the most part; money would go to the church, the fire department, the school, etc. The usual ticket price was about \$2 (\$60) and would include a banquet. The dances usually lasted until 4 or 5 the next morning, after

which a breakfast was served.

Another Christmas Day tradition was shooting matches. Wilmington in particular was known for her Christmas Day pigeon and turkey shoots. A good shot might bring home enough pigeons or turkeys to feed his family for days.

An unusual, but popular place to visit on Christmas Day was the Joliet Penitentiary. Strange as it may seem, it was thought that if the convicts could see the upright honest folks on that day, their heart would change and they would want to walk the straight and narrow. After religious services, and before the Christmas dinner was served, the Warden would give out Christmas pardons as his gift to the prisoners.

My Christmas wish for you, gentle readers, is that your day be spent with friends and family and that the peace of the season be yours, even if it's for just one day.

"Behind every denied Medicare Advantage claim is a senior in need of care. Improving transparency in health care isn't just about streamlining bureaucracy; it's about preserving dignity and ensuring compassion for individuals at their most vulnerable moments."

Madigan should have known to walk away

Whenever someone assures you that another person you're both dealing with "understands" the "quid pro quo," you'd be wise to run away as fast as you can and never look back.

But that's exactly how then Ald. Daniel Solis assured then House Speaker Michael Madigan in late June of 2017 that their mark – the developers of a West Loop apartment complex – would eventually be convinced to retain Madigan's property tax appeals law firm.

Solis chaired the powerful Zoning Committee, so the developers had to come through him, and Solis said they would understand the game: The developers hire Madigan's law firm and their zoning changes would be approved.

"I think they understand how this works," Solis told Madigan. "The quid pro quo."

Solis admitted on the stand during Madigan's corruption trial that what he said to Madigan was "dumb."

Madigan didn't know that the federal government was recording all his conversations with Solis. So, what was dumb about what Solis said is that Madigan might've immediately cut all ties to Solis, and Solis' federal handlers

would've been furious that he let the target get away.

Turns out, the real dummy was Madigan.

Madigan didn't walk away. Instead, he kept going back to Solis, only gently admonishing him weeks later by telling Solis not to say the quiet part out loud and instructing him in the polite way of conducting business.

And then a few months later, while talking about another real estate deal, Solis asked whether the West Loop developers had signed on with Madigan's firm. Madigan didn't say, but appeared to give Solis the go-ahead to process their zoning request.

"You were contemplating processing something," Madigan said. "You should go ahead and process that."

The feds are also trying to prove that Madigan's consigliere, longtime lobbyist and fellow defendant Mike McClain wasn't just freelancing without Madigan's approval when it came to all the demands McClain was making of ComEd.

The trial so far has given the feds big wins on that point. Madigan and Solis were in discussions about the state transferring a Chinatown parking lot to the City of Chicago so that it could be developed into a hotel, and Madigan could get the property tax business. So, he told Solis to reach out to McClain.

McClain would give the developer "some ideas about how to go about it."

A couple of months later, Solis again brought up the Chinatown parcel to Madigan. "Let me get back into it and, and, um, see if there's some way to find somebody that can talk to IDOT. That, that's where the decision's going to be made," Madigan said.

"I'm trying to figure out a way to approach it," Madigan later told Solis about the parcel. He appeared to be calculating how he could pass a bill to benefit his law firm without leaving any overt fingerprints.

Madigan eventually told Solis that one of the Chinatown developers would soon be receiving a call from McClain.

The effort to transfer the property extended into the spring of 2018 for several reasons, most importantly opposition from local legislators.

In March of 2018, Madigan told Solis that maybe McClain should talk to the Senator who was putting a brick on the land transfer and then explained to Solis at length how this particular legislation could shorten the time it would take to transfer the property to the city.

From there, jurors heard recordings about the intricacies of passing the bill, including who was blocking it. McClain is heard on a recording briefing Madigan about which legislators were opposing the bill and about how the then-Secretary of Transportation was "getting squeamish" about it.

Also in March, Solis told Madigan that if Madigan could "take care of that [Chinatown] matter in May," during the end of spring session, "I'm confident they'll appreciate it and ... sign you up on after May." Madigan didn't run away then, either.

But the bill eventually died and a possible payday was missed.

On May 28, 2018, a few days before the scheduled end of spring session when there was still hope the bill would advance, McClain called a member of Madigan's House staff to tell them about the property tax transfer bill, "that deals with a developer of [Madigan's]." McClain told the staffer: "He wants to make sure he votes 'present.'"

In other words, if the feds didn't have Madigan, McClain and Solis on numerous recordings, Madigan could've officially covered his rear by voting "present" on a bill that would've potentially padded his pockets and that he'd allegedly been actively pushing behind the scenes for months on end.

Midewin welcome center will be closed until end of January

The U.S. Department of Agriculture, Forest Service announced that the Midewin National Tallgrass Prairie (NTP) supervisor's office, to include the welcome center, will be temporarily closed from December 9, 2024 to January 27, 2025 for extensive maintenance to the heating, ventilation, and air conditioning (HVAC) system.

Midewin NTP trails, heads, trails and hunting areas will remain open during this time. Some educational programming, to include the winter lecture series, that typically takes place in December and January will be rescheduled to a later date.

Throughout the clo-

sure, staff and partners will be assigned to alternate work locations to complete the ongoing work of restoring and administering the Forest Service's only Tallgrass Prairie.

"We had hoped to be able to update the system without closing the entire supervisor's office," said Christina Henderson, Midewin NTP's prairie supervisor. "Unfortunately, with the nature and the extent of the work that needs to be done, that isn't possible."

During the winter months of 2024, the HVAC system's inability to keep the temperature regulated led to frozen pipes that eventually broke.

"We've seen over the last few years that our HVAC system simply couldn't keep up with the extremely cold days in the winter, and the hot days in the summer," said Henderson. "For the health and safety of our staff and our partners, this overhaul of the system has to be done."

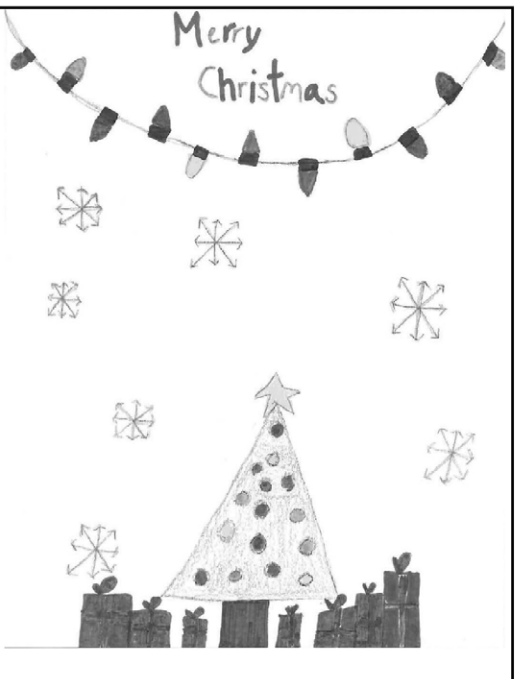

Gas prices dipping below \$3/gallon

Average gasoline prices in Illinois have fallen 8.8 cents per gallon in the last week, averaging \$3.11/g, according to GasBuddy's survey of 4,378 stations in Illinois.

Prices in Illinois are 5.3 cents per gallon lower than a month ago and stand 14.2 cents per gallon lower than a year ago.

That may be true in general, but in our coverage area gas stations seem to have a difficult time keeping gas below \$3/g.

In Wilmington, expect to pay anywhere from \$2.88/g at Mohsen up to \$3.07/g at Circle K. Braidwood gas will run you \$3.03/g at BP, or up to \$3.15/g at Casey's.

Coal City gas prices are \$2.99/g across the board. Morris gas ranges from \$2.94/g at Casey's, up to \$3.09/g at Amoco.

Bourbonnais comes in lowest with gas ranging from \$2.77/g at Gas N Wash, up to \$2.83/g at Circle K.

"The national average has finally fallen below \$3 per gallon, and it couldn't come at a better time for motorists with the holidays upon us. One would need to count over 1,300 days since we've seen the national average this low, with the affordability of gasoline at its lowest non-COVID level since 2015," said Patrick De Haan, head of petroleum analysis at GasBuddy.

"With average gas prices in 35 states and nearly 110,000 stations below \$3 per gallon, Americans are putting in just 5.44 minutes of work to buy a gallon."

The lowest price in the state Monday was \$2.49/g while the highest was \$4.59/g, a difference of \$2.10/g.

State Police seeing drop in road shootings

After extensive investigations, Illinois State Police (ISP) Zone 1 Violent Crime Unit East special agents obtained charges in all five Chicago area expressway shooting homicides that occurred in 2023.

"With intelligent investigations, technology, and good old-fashioned persistence, ISP special agents were able to not just clear 100% of Chicago area expressway shooting homicides in 2023, but obtain criminal charges in 100% of cases," said Illinois State Police Director Brendan F. Kelly.

"We will continue to relentlessly pur-

sue justice for the victims of gun violence."

ISP obtained first-degree murder charges in each of the five Chicago area expressway shooting homicides in 2023.

Those shooting occurred on Interstate 55 northbound, two on Interstate 57 northbound, Interstate 290 eastbound, west of Laramie Avenue and on Interstate 94 northbound at 138th Street.

Chicago area expressway shootings are down 32% compared to this time last year, 51% compared to 2022, and 71% compared to 2021.

Low income consumers protected from having their heat shut off

The Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC) is reminding consumers that Illinois' winter weather rule is in effect through March 31.

The winter weather rule prohibits utilities from disconnecting eligible customers who use electric or gas as their primary source of home heating.

"The state's winter weather rule offers peace-of-mind for individuals and families who might otherwise be struggling to stay warm during the coldest months of the year," said ICC Chairman Doug Scott.

To protect Illinoisans during dangerous cold, Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and Percentage of Income Payment Plan (PIPP) participants; electric space heating customers; and military personnel and veterans cannot be disconnected if they fall behind on their utility bills. The rule excludes disconnec-

tions related to theft, tampering, or safety.

The cold weather rule also protects residential customers from disconnections when temperatures are forecasted to be at or below 32 F, and on days preceding holidays and weekends when the forecast is expected to drop to freezing.

To protect against disconnection, customers with past due balances should contact their utility to enroll in a Deferred Payment Agreement (DPA). If your electric or gas service has already been disconnected, contact your utility directly to see if you qualify for reconnection at less than the full amount owed.

Other residential customers or master-metered apartment buildings who used gas or electricity as the primary source of space heating equipment during the previous winter cannot be disconnected for non-

payment unless: the utility has offered the customer a DPA with a maximum down payment of 10 percent; provided the customer with contact information for public and private aid agencies; the customer refused to enter a DPA; and all disconnection notices provisions have been met.

Households struggling to pay their utility bills are encouraged to apply for LIHEAP annually with the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.

Natural gas customers who qualify for LIHEAP or whose incomes are at or below 300 percent of the federal poverty line are eligible for a monthly discount on their gas bills through the state's new low-income discount rates.

Whispering Pines Reindeer Ranch & Tree Farm delivers holiday glee

Every morning, Randy and Beth Espe watch reindeer frolic outside their kitchen window as they sip their morning coffee - a delightful daily ritual they have fondly dubbed the "rodeo."

Santa himself would envy their view.

"When they go out into the pasture, they get giddy because it's cool, and that's their playtime," Randy says of the reindeer. "They run, they jump, they kick, they spin. It's pretty amazing to see."

And so, the day begins at Whispering Pines Reindeer Ranch & Tree Farm in Shabbona, where the Espe family's labor of love grew into a beloved holiday tradition for countless families.

Reining in holiday cheer

What might seem an unlikely retirement gig comes as a slight surprise to those who know Randy well.

"People would bring me abandoned and orphaned animals when I was young," Randy says. "We raised a lot of raccoons, a pet fox, a little bit of everything. I always dreamed about raising white-tailed deer at some point. But reindeer turned out to be a better choice because they are domesticated. You can snap a halter on them and walk them around on a lead rope - and you can just sit and love on them."

His dream of deer became a reality after Beth retired from Northern Illinois University and Randy wrapped up a 40-year career in the seed business. As they started a second act in life, the couple set aside 18 acres to grow the small Christmas tree operation they began years earlier on the family farm.

As Randy researched ways to promote Christmas trees, he discovered Hardy's Reindeer Ranch in Rantoul. He visited owner Mark Hardy for some tips and promptly fell in love with reindeer.

"In hindsight, I wish I had listened better to Mark," Randy says. "He told me to take all the money I was going to spend on Christmas trees and buy another reindeer or two. Reindeer have turned into our major focus, and they are actually less work than the Christmas trees."

Before buying any reindeer of their own, the Espes joined the Reindeer Owners and Breeders Association (ROBA) and the Reindeer Farmers Association (RFA) to learn

how to responsibly breed and care for reindeer. By 2018, they felt ready to welcome their first four reindeer from Alaska. Today, their herd numbers more than a dozen.

Arctic adaptability
A close but more laid-back cousin to the caribou, reindeer represent a distinct subspecies and long-time friends to humans.

"The Laplanders domesticated reindeer thousands of years ago," says Randy, referring to the Sami people of the northern regions of Scandinavia. "Reindeer are to the Laplanders what the buffalo was to the American Indian."

Far from their native lands in the Arctic and mountainous regions of eastern Europe, Siberia and Scandinavia, reindeer living in Illinois require special care. According to Randy, ticks and heat present the biggest challenges.

Reindeer delight in frigid winter weather. During warmer months, the reindeer typically stay in the barn throughout the day, emerging at dawn and dusk to graze in cooler temperatures.

Those amazing antlers - grown by both males and females - also present a serious safety hazard for reindeer. Sprawling like a tree canopy, the antlers can easily become wedged in a fence or gate.

"Reindeer antlers go in all different directions," Randy says. "It's one of the bigger challenges of working with them. We've done everything we can to make our fencing safer and try to eliminate places they can get caught."

Randy notes the steep

learning curve involved with raising a nonnative animal and the importance of joining organizations like RFA and ROBA to learn from others' experiences.

"A lot of products you might typically use for farm animals are not labeled for reindeer," Randy says. "We medicate them like sheep, feed them like a cow because they're ruminant, and treat their hair and skin like a horse because they're sensitive."

Magical moments

The Espes have also learned reindeer have a magic all their own. With their friendly natures and impressive appearance, the Espes' reindeer often outshine Santa at the many holiday events they attend.

"The reindeer always create a lot of excitement," Randy says. "Kids just get giddy, and their eyes light up. It's heartwarming to see how much happiness they bring."

Every Thanksgiving weekend, the Espes open their ranch to the public for a holiday experience, complete with Santa, reindeer and countless Christmas trees. Eight varieties of evergreen trees grow at Whispering Pines Reindeer Ranch & Tree Farm, and 2024 marks the first year you can cut your own.

You will also find the Espe family and their reindeer at holiday festivals, Christmas parades and tree-lighting ceremonies across northern and central Illinois throughout the holiday season. To further delight young visitors, Randy and Beth's three daughters dress up as elves.

Beth recalls a young boy named Fritz who was only mildly excited to see

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Concerns about dish soap being bad for the planet

Dear EarthTalk: Are mainstream dish soaps really that bad for the planet? And if so, what are some greener alternatives?

Popular dish soaps often claim to easily tackle grease, leave dishes sparkling clean and uphold commitments to sustainability and safety. But these promises are often misleading.

These products may deliver on cleaning power,

but they often come at a high cost to human health, animal welfare and the environment. Many well-known dish soaps contain synthetic chemicals and

additives that are harmful.

The main chemicals in dish soaps include Methylisothiazolinone, 4-dioxane, and fragrance and dye additives. Methylisothiazolinone is a synthetic preservative which inhibits the growth of bacteria and fungi, helping to give sponges a long useful life.

The chemical is also a skin irritant for many and highly toxic in aquatic environments. 4-dioxane, though not intentionally

added into dish soaps, is the byproduct of other chemical reactions. As a recognized groundwater pollutant, 4-dioxane is notoriously difficult to filter out during water treatment.

The lemony-fresh scent many associate with cleanliness comes from synthetic fragrances, which act as air and aquatic pollutants. Dyes, which create visual appeal, are persistent pollutants that can linger in the environment for decades, contaminating waterways.

The environmental harm of dish soap extends beyond usage to its production. The industry ranks as the fourth-largest contributor to toxic pollution, with weighty impacts on com-

munities near production facilities.

The factories emit high levels of harmful chemicals, worsening climate change and exposing local populations to increased cancer risks. The toxic footprint also extends along transportation routes, especially from South Carolina through Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and Texas.

Luckily, there are several options that are better for the environment and individual health. Cleancult Liquid Dish Soap is made from plant bases and does not use animal testing.

It cleans efficiently, is easy on sensitive skin, does not contain harmful chemical, and received an "A"

environmental rating. Dr. Bronner's Pure Castile Liquid Soap, generally known as a camping dish soap, is another grade "A" certified soap with strong Environmental, social, and governance (ESG) principles guiding production.

It uses basic ingredients, designed to be safe in waterways.

Koala EcoNatural Dish Soap is made without synthetic fragrances, using essential oils instead, and holds two toxic chemical-free certifications. These alternatives are available at a slightly higher price point, but are much worth the investment.

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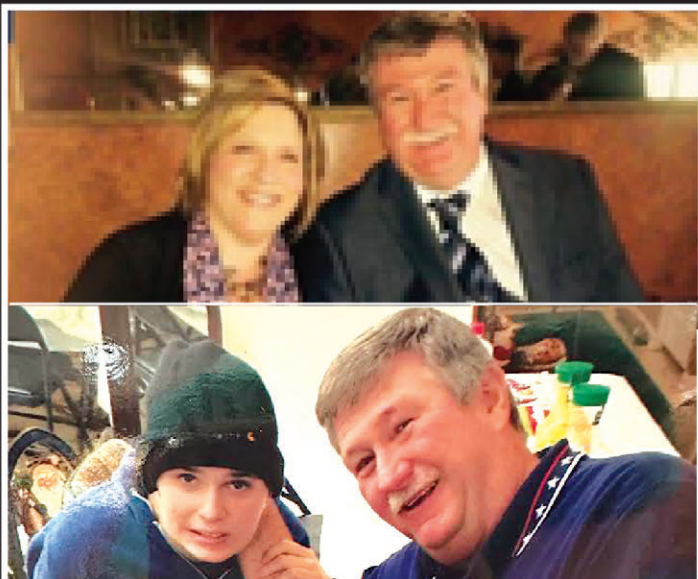


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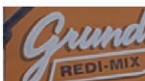
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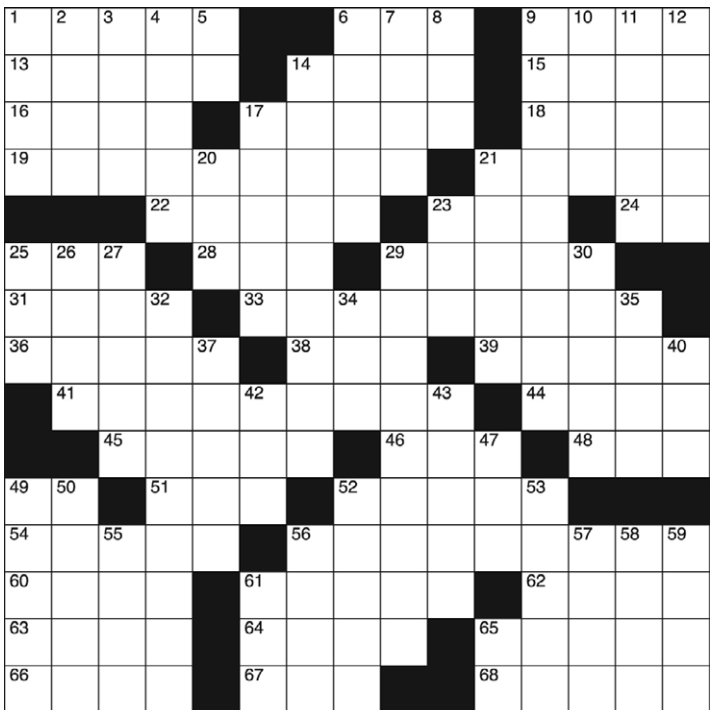
