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Owner of ‘Art on 66’ returns home to find peace

It was a long journey home for Rachel Conforti, 47, owner and curator of Art on 66. After 20 years in the west, Conforti and her daughter Siena recently returned to Wilmington.

A pharmacist by trade, Conforti returned to Wilmington from Arizona to heal. You see, her 14-year-old daughter, Sabrina, passed away on Nov. 14, 2021. Exactly one year and one day later, her ex-husband, Joe Conforti, died.

“I lost my daughter Sabrina to cancer,” Conforti said. “Then we lost her father, who was my ex-husband. I felt we needed to get back to Wilmington where my parents live. We needed to come back home.”

A Wilmington native, Conforti attended St. Rose School, and took the idea of Route 66 for granted. It was merely a tourist trap that meandered through town. Though she loved Wilmington, she longed to travel, to explore the world. Wanderlust drew her heart to the west.

“The past 20 years, I’ve been living out west, and my daughter and I just moved back here in 2023,” Conforti said. “We were in Scottsdale, Arizona for three years. Before that, we were in Nevada for 14 years.”

Conforti returned to Arizona briefly before returning to Illinois. “We moved from Nevada to Phoenix because medical treatment there was better for Sabrina,” Conforti said. “She was stable at the time but, we were hoping, God forbid, to have the treatment facilities within 20 minutes if her cancer returned.”

Tragically, Sabrina succumbed to cancer. Then, her ex-husband passed. Conforti and her daughter, Siena, left the west on the road she once viewed as a tourist trap but now became her lifeline between Phoenix and Wilmington.

Seeking peace

Conforti is manager of a Walmart pharmacy, where she

works 25 hours per week. While she had no desire to work 40 hours, she found herself with too much time on her hands to question fate. She needed to find something to do to quiet her mind.

“I thought I’d like to go into business for myself,” Conforti said. “The outside of Wilmington downtown has a vibe, and it’s a familiar vibe. The antique stores are great. But, I wanted something different.”

Meandering down Water Street, Conforti spotted the old Watch Shop. She imagined works of art along the walls. She envisioned herself as curator and shop owner. The old building called to her, and she answered

tentatively. Perhaps art would soothe her soul.

“The owners, Cheryl Baron and Pat Baron, decided to rehab it,” Conforti said. “The ceiling was falling in. The floor was falling apart. They had to remodel the entire front of it.”

When Conforti explained her plans for an art gallery, the owners informed her the “Watch Shop” sign would have to remain. To Conforti, it was a sign.

“I was excited because the sign would be perfect, like historic,” Conforti said.

Learning a new trade

Though Conforti had never before owned a shop, she was already in a management and well versed in customer service as

manager of a pharmacy.

“I took some online classes and went to a couple like art expos,” Conforti said. “It all felt right, and it fell into place.”

Once she felt settled and relatively confident, she reached out to local artists. That too, fell into place, as a respectable number of artists responded.

“I host all these artists and they do beautiful work,” Conforti said. “And I try to keep it eclectic. It’s all modern art. Some pieces are more contemporary.”

Art on 66 features original art by Mary N. Carnahan, Rick Decorie, Karyn Denten, Jennifer Diver, Barbara Eberhard, Rebecca Marfise, Warren Miller, Robert Ryan, Lizzie Selle, and Erika

Vazzana.

A variety of styles and media are offered, including Americana, with Wilmington’s mascot, the Gemini Giant, featured in a number of works.

A miniature Gemini Giant taped to the gallery wall is a nod to Conforti’s quirky sense of humor, with a nod to artist Maurizio Cattalon, who auctioned off a banana taped to a wall for \$6.24 million at Sotheby’s in New York.

“I was like, oh we have to do something like that,” Conforti said. “That was great, hilarious. I still can’t get enough of it. So, we did our own interpretation.”

A commemorative piece by Robert Ryan, featuring the Gemini Giant against the backdrop of a Route 66 road sign sold Nov. 30, the very same day the Gemini Giant returned to town.

“It was such a hit that the artist has decided to do some limited edition prints,” Conforti said.

Artist Bill Law focuses on time. He designs abstract clocks. Whether incidentally or purposefully, his work pays tribute to the former watch shop.

Something for everyone

Opening night, Oct. 12, attracted more than 200 people to the gallery, many leaving the shop with original art in hand and a smile on their face.

Featured is a painting of an extroverted fellow capering along the banks of the Kankakee River with a cigar in his mouth.

“This guy is a huge hit,” Conforti said. “He’s one of my favorites, too. Everyone knows the guy; he is in all of the beach clubs around here.”

Return to the river

Conforti paces the length of her shop, gingerly touching some of the art pieces en route. She opens the back door, and there is the Kankakee River. A frigid wind blows through the shop.

Conforti loves to listen to the perpetual splash of the “waterfall” outside her door and remembers being a child.

“My cousin and I would sit on those boulders by the river,”

One step closer to construction of Amazon

The city council approved tax increment financing (TIF) for the Ridgeport Logistics Center Intermodal Facility terminal that will allow for a second giant Amazon warehouse off Lorenzo Road.

The city has spent months modifying its TIF so it can include the new 1.65 million square foot facility that will be built on South Kavanaugh Road.

Benjamin Schuster of Elrod Friedman, LP law firm, representative of Ridgeport/Elion, suggested a change to city aldermen, during their Dec. 17 meeting, in the fourth amendment of the agreement.

He said that should Amazon fail to pay the incremental property taxes generated from that Amazon parcel, that the amount be paid directly to the developer, and then forwarded to the city of Wilmington.

“The bottom line is ‘Hey Amazon, you’re responsible for the taxes,’” Schuster said. “This does nothing, that would impact the city.

It’s really just an agreement between the park owner, and Amazon, but it doesn’t change obligations to you.”

The city authorized a study to further adjusting the boundaries of the Redevelopment Project Area and adopting an amendment to the TIF plan in relation thereto.

Time Line:

August 23, 2024: Announced the availability of the Eligibility Study Amendment and TIF Plan Amendment at a city council meeting.

Sept. 3, 2024: Approved an ordinance calling for a joint review board meeting and public hearing relative to the proposed approval of the Amended Redevelopment Project Area and the TIF Plan Amendment.

Sept. 4, 2024: Mailed notices relative to the availability of the study amendment and TIF plan amendment to residential addresses within 750 feet of the boundaries of the amended project area and all parties registered on the city’s TIF interested parties registry via First Class Mail.

Sept. 5, 2024: Mailed copies of ordinance, eligibility study amend-

ment, TIF plan amendment, and notice of the joint review board meeting to all taxing districts, the Illinois Dept. of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, and the public member of the joint review board via certified mail.

Sept. 24, 2024: Joint review board meeting held. **Nov. 20 and 27, 2024:** Published notice of public hearing in newspaper. **Dec. 3, 2024:** A public hearing was held.

Few other actions

The council approved the payment of \$5,370.25 to Clennon Electric to replace the sludge holding tank mixing motor starter.

The council tabled the filter turbidity meters and controller quotes for the time being.

The council approved pay request no. 3 for \$19,831.25, and pay request no 4, for \$27,482.70 to Hoerr Construction for the Kankakee Street Sanitary Sewer Lining Project.

The council approved an invoice from Kankakee Truck and Equipment for \$7,020.86, and a quote from Trojan Technologies for \$5,906.

“Papa, have you ever met anyone famous?”

The question came from my granddaughter Layla, a second grader, who has the curiosity of someone twice her age.

“I still remember the day I met my first famous person,” I said as I sat next to her to give her the details.

We were standing near the tarmac outside the airport in Burlington, IA. It was early afternoon and a twin turbo-prop aircraft was taxiing to a stop. A sudden rush of air from the prop wash blew the cowboy hat off my head.

Among them was Ken Curtis, better known as the American actor/singer Festus Haggen of the long-running Western TV series “Gunsmoke.”

At age 5 years old I expected to see Festus dressed like he was on TV. But there he was wearing dress pants and a white shirt. Was I ever disappoint-

ed.

Still, he lived up to character as a scruffy old deputy on the TV show as my mother, Janet, introduced herself then my sister and me. He winked and commented how he liked my cowboy duds.

Festus came to Iowa to perform during the three-day Tri-State Rodeo that would take place in Fort Madison, IA.

Little did he know that we were his ride.

Our mother was a volunteer on the Tri-State Rodeo committee. Among her duties was to make sure Festus had ground transportation to his hotel.

It being 1965 in the middle of where the tall corn grows, my guess is the nearest limousine was half the state away. So being the wise mother that she was, the Fisher limo, a big blue Chevy station wagon, would serve just as well. And it came with two youngsters riding in the back.

We had been warned to behave, or else, so for the 20-mile ride back home to Fort Madison, little Janet and I sat in the back while mom drove and Festus rode shotgun. I don't recall exactly what was said but I do recall me pointing my pistols out the window at cows on the way home.

I told her about when I was in first grade our family rode a jet to California to visit Disneyland.

My father George was publisher of the Evening Democrat, in Fort Madison, owned by McGiffin Company who also had newspapers in California. So we had “connections” when we got there, including a tour of Universal Studios.

Our family of 10 was given an escort to walk the grounds. We got to meet Art Linkletter, the host of the Art Linkletter Show, a popular TV series that started in 1963. He commented that he was impressed that our family got dressed up to go on vacation. We all laughed, as we stood getting our photo taken with Mr. Linkletter. But deep down it made me question why as a youngster from Iowa, I had to where a suit and tie while on vacation.

Little Layla laughed at that too when I told her of our California trip.

“Oh, I forgot. That's when we met the Smoothers Brothers!” I exclaimed.

The Fishers were riding

an elevator down the main building at Universal when it stopped short of the lobby and the doors opened. Waiting to get on were The Smothers Brothers, Tom and Dick, hosts of a popular comedy show.

“Whoa are these all yours?” Tommy joked as he made eye contact with our parents. “You've got enough to fill an elevator! That's okay, we'll wait for the next one.”

There was another time I met someone famous on an elevator. The year was 1973, I was 12, waiting with sister Janet to get on an elevator at a hotel in South Bend, Ind. We were there to visit brothers Marc and Alan who were attending the University of Notre Dame.

The doors opened, Janet and I stepped in for the ride up, when suddenly we were squished into a corner by an entourage with Lionel Richie. They were a laughing, festive group carrying cocktails and bottles but there was a distinct smell that was a little skunky. We found out later the Commodores had a concert that night at ND.

Speaking of the Irish I can't leave out the time I sipped a vodka tonic in the same room as football coach Lou Holtz the year after Notre Dame won the 1988 national championship. We printed the programs for the Notre Dame Club of Chicago and brother Alan invited me to the VIP reception before their annual banquet.

I explain to Layla that Holtz was probably the most motivational speaker I've ever heard.

I told Layla I also met the Mayor of Chicago, Richard M. Daley in November of 2011. My bride, Janet, and I were invited to the Irish Fellowship Club of Chicago where Daley would accept the grand marshal of the St. Patrick's Day parade. We lined up to have our photograph taken with the mayor. When out turn came we stepped up and Daley asked, “Where you folks from?” “Wilmington,” we replied. He knew the town, he said. “That's where they've got that green giant.” Evidence the Gemini Giant truly is iconic.

I also told her I got to meet George W. Bush. He was campaigning for president with running mate Dick Cheney, making a train stop in Joliet. I had credentials to join the press

“Papa is that every-

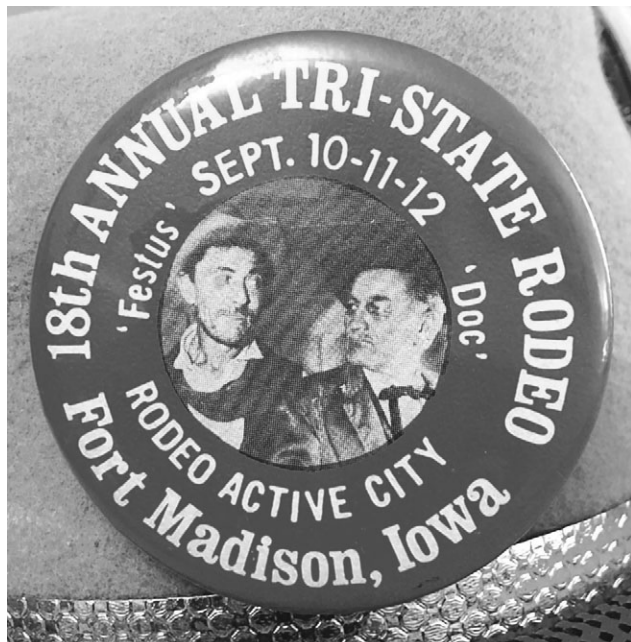
one?” she asked. “I don't think any of those people are famous because I've never heard of them. Besides, I've met someone more famous than all of them,” she said. “He's known all over the world.”

Conforti said. “He'd hunt for crawdads and I'd just sit and watch the waterfall.”

At 47, Conforti is dividing her time between her work as a pharmacist and her sideline as an art

curator. Every single moment is filled. Conforti said she likes to stay busy. She smiles tentatively, then a tear escapes before she can blink it back.

“I'm sorry, sometimes

that just happens,” she said.

Healing and peace

“What I love about this place is nothing is truly an emergency,” Conforti said. “There are really no art emergencies like there are pharmacy emergencies... or medical emergencies.”

Conforti appears serene seated at her minimalist desk. The floor of the shop has been expoxied, gleaming like a river through a riot of color and texture. The shop is her place of peace.

Her days are filled, and she understands grief is a journey, similar to the one from Arizona to Wilmington via Route 66.

She looks forward to the passage of time. She imagines retiring and spending more time savoring art. She grins and the sadness leaves her eyes.

“Oh my God. I would love to be here full-time when I retire,” Conforti

Christmas 138 years ago, 1886 holiday season

In the spirit of the Ghost of Christmas Past, today we hop aboard the way-back machine to 1886 to celebrate the holidays in Wilmington.

I find the absolutely most popular thing to do during the holiday season in the 1880's was to get married. The Wilmington Advocate of December 3, 1886 was full of news about marriages. Miss Cora Camp and Mr. John McDonald were married in Wilmington and honeymooned in Chicago. But it was a small occasion compared to the wedding of Mr. Fred Loudon and Miss Annie Ackerman of Wesley. And as was the custom of the time, all the wedding presents were listed in the paper, and who gave them. Amid the many sets of dishes and silver, it must have embarrassed Nora Marshall to have it put in the paper that she gave a "clothes pin apron." This couple honeymooned in Chicago as well.

The following week, the Supervisor of Wesley Township, John Corlett gave his daughter in marriage. Unfortunately, the article did not mention whom she married. Ed Conley of the Advocate attended and said this of the party afterwards, "If the denizens of the great

metropolis of Wilmington, who are unacquainted with the free and easy going Wesleyites, will spend a winter among them, we will guarantee they will learn how to get as much fun into a given space of time - minus the formalities and conventionalisms of city life - as any rural town in Will County." Oh, those wild Wesley people!

The 1880's also saw the rise of Christmas commercialism. There were twice the holiday advertisements as there were in the 1870's. The largest ad in the paper belonged to our old friend Ike Cracraft. Ike had started out in the restaurant business, bought a bookstore, then a shoe store, and by 1886 he was the proud owner of a men's furnishings store. There he sold everything a gentleman needed to be in the latest fashion.

Other holiday goods for sale were imported wax dolls, cigar and cigarette cases, music rolls for the newly invented player piano, velocipedes (bicycles), silk scarves, sealskin hats, and of course skates and sleds.

While today we see ads for cars as gifts during the holiday season, then there were ads for horse drawn conveyances. We read,

"Dorsey & Stewart have just received this week two car loads of cutters and bob sleighs, which they have bought at a very low figure, and are prepared to offer them to the public so that everybody can afford to have one. Call and see them and get their prices."

Two new businesses opened in downtown Wilmington opened that season. "Obed Hollister has opened a confectionary store and oyster parlor in the Campbell building, 59 Water Street, and desires the public to call and inspect his new quarters. He has a fine line of confectionery, fruits, nuts, cigars, and tobacco, while he is also prepared to serve oysters in every known style in the rooms over his store, which are elegantly fitted up. Supplying families with oysters made a specialty."

"James Galloway has opened a shooting gallery in the Hart building, third door north of Dr. Willard's drug store."

The Catholic community was looking forward to Christmas of 1886. Their new building was ready, and on Christmas Day of 1886 at 5 a.m. the first high mass ever to be celebrated in the church was attended by a record number of worshippers.

Of course, the beautiful new stone building on Kankakee Street was wonderful, but that little old frame building on Water Street had been home to the congregation for 50

years.

We read, "The last high mass celebrated in the old Catholic church here was on Sunday last, the Rev. Father McGrath officiating. In the course of his sermon he awakened many emotions in reverting to the old building and scenes within its venerable walls. Here many came in their baptismal robes, in wedding garments, and in the silent shrouds of death; here many a burdened soul poured out its afflictions and went away purer and lighter of heart. Time cannot efface such recollections while the parishioners cling to life."

"On to-morrow morning the new Catholic church - St. Rose's - will be for the first time thrown open to its congregation, and a happy Christmas day it will be for the parish."

"New altars and rail, new pews, the best cathedral stained glass in all of the windows, unexceeded fresco work, steam-heating coils, fine gallery and organ loft - these are some of the characteristics of the new church. It is Gothic in style throughout, and immediately over the main altar are fine life-size paintings on glass of St. Patrick and of St. Rose of Lima, the capital of Peru, South America."

Christmas morning dawned bright and crisp and clear. At 5:30 a.m. the new bells rang Christmas in with a joyous spirit.

Giant Fund Me given to the city

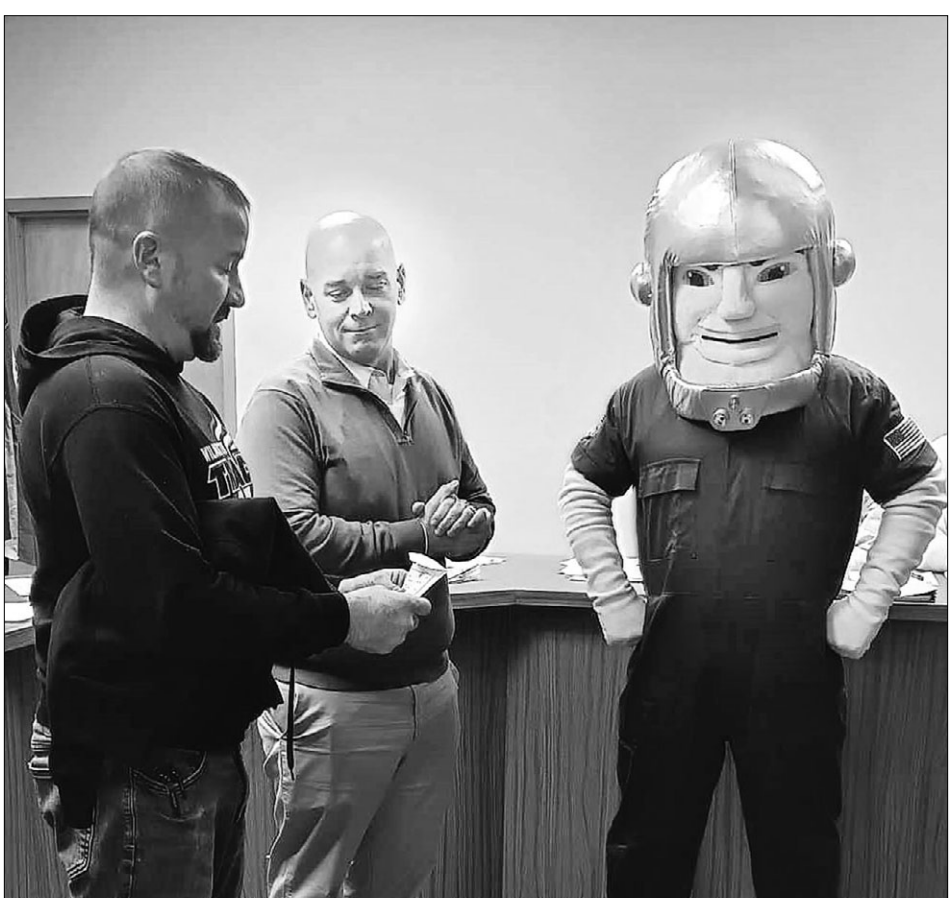

Imagination Library coming to Will County

Will County is partnering with The Dollywood Foundation to bring Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to Will County.

The partnership kicks off a county-wide fundraising campaign to fully launch the book-gifting program in Will County, which mails free, high-quality and age-appropriate books to children from birth to age five.

Since launching in 1995, Dolly Parton's Imagination Library has become the preeminent early childhood book-gifting program in the world. The flagship program of The Dollywood Foundation has gifted over 250 million free books in the United States, Canada, United Kingdom, Australia, and The Republic of Ireland.

"The power of books is undeniable," said County Executive Jennifer Bertino-Tarrant. "The earlier we get them into our children's hands the more opportunities we provide for our earliest learners. We have a unique opportunity, with the help of the State of Illinois, to develop emergent readers and create a foundation for the love of books."

The Imagination Library of Will County is supported by the statewide expansion of the program launched by Governor JB Pritzker in December 2023.

The state program matches every dollar raised locally, improving the ability of county-wide programs to raise funds and register children. With the state match, every \$16 raised locally will sponsor one child to receive a full year of high-quality, age-appropriate books.

Research has shown that the first five years of life are critical for young children, with around 90% of brain development occurring during those years. Daily readings by parents or caregivers provide the greatest opportunity to prepare their child for school, and literacy is a long-term major social determinant of health and economic impact.

Children receiving books through the Imagination Library see increased readiness for kindergarten and higher academic achievement.

To fully launch the program and begin registering local children, a fundraising goal of \$150,000 has been established to sustain operations for the first two years.

In partnership with the Rialto Square Theatre, a kick-off fundraising event will be held on Jan. 30 in celebration of Imagination Library and Dolly Parton's January birthday. The "Imagination Celebration - A Dolly Parton Birthday Book Bash" will feature a celebratory reception and a showing of the 1980 classic "9 to 5", starring Dolly Parton.

All proceeds from the event will support the Imagination Library of Will County. The reception will begin at 5:30 p.m. on Jan. 30 at the Rialto Square Theatre in Joliet, with the movie starting at 7 p.m.

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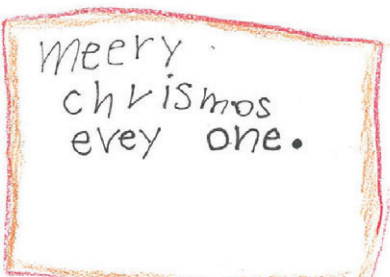
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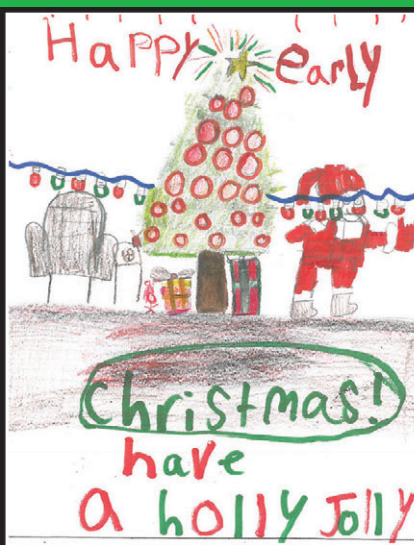
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Final deer harvest during firearm season increases

Hunters in Illinois took a preliminary total of 82,496 deer during the seven-day 2024 Illinois firearm deer season that concluded Dec. 8.

Comparatively, hunters harvested 76,494 deer during the 2023 firearm season.

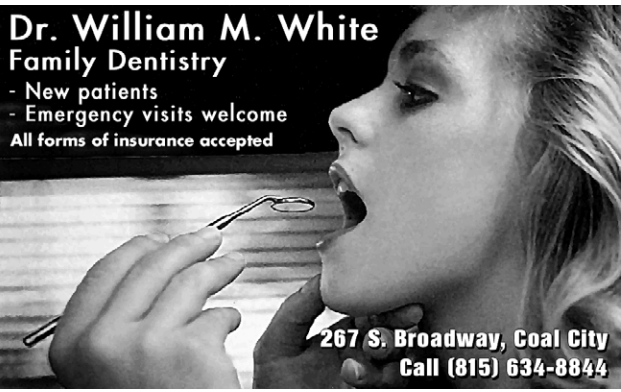
The preliminary harvest for the second segment of the 2024 firearm season Dec. 5-8 was 27,835 compared with 22,883 deer harvested during the second part of the 2023 season. The preliminary harvest for the first segment of this year's firearm season Nov. 22-24 was 54,661 deer.

Hunters bagged more deer this year than last in Grundy (320 to 285) and Kankakee (203 to 190) counties. Will County hunters took fewer deer (226) compared to a year ago (231).

Remaining 2024-2025 deer hunting opportunities in Illinois include Late-winter antlerless-only and chronic wasting disease (CWD) season, in designated counties only, Dec. 26-29 and Jan. 17-19.

Archery deer season continues through Jan. 19.

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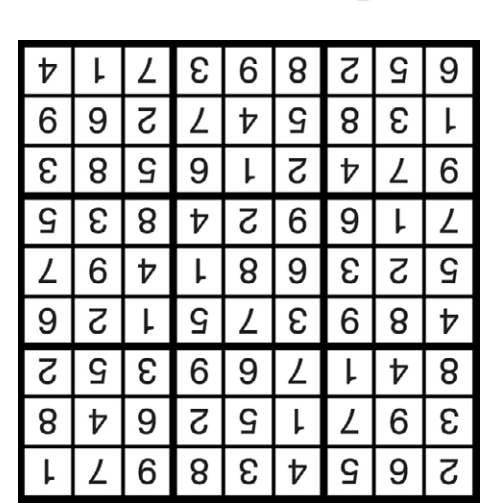
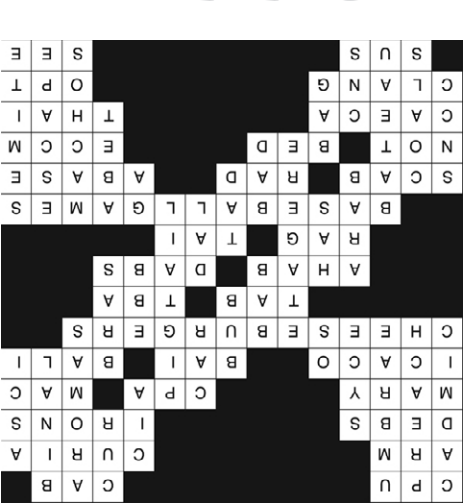
